World Breastfeeding Week

Breastfeeding is a cornerstone of child survival, nutrition, and development. It provides essential nutrients, strengthens the immune system, and fosters a strong bond between mother and child. For mothers, breastfeeding reduces the risk of certain cancers and promotes postpartum recovery.

Despite these benefits, many mothers face challenges that hinder breastfeeding, such as lack of support, misinformation, and societal pressures. World Breastfeeding Week highlights these issues and promotes actions to overcome them, ensuring that every child has the best start in life.

Every year, from August 1 through 7, the World Alliance for Breastfeeding Action (WABA) celebrates breastfeeding during their global

campaign. The goal of this campaign is to raise awareness and galvanize actions on themes related to breastfeeding. This year's theme is Prioritize Breastfeeding: Create Sustainable Support Systems. The four objectives of this campaign remain the same every year: inform; anchor; engage; and galvanize. This year we want to Inform people about their role in creating supportive and sustainable environments for breastfeeding; Anchor continuous breastfeeding support as a vital component to create a sustainable environment; Engage with individuals and organizations to enhance collaboration and support for breastfeeding; and Galvanize actions by connecting breastfeeding systems to create a sustainable environment.

Parking at 3WB

With staff returning from summer break, the parking lot at 3 West Broadway will near capacity. Staff should avoid parking along the fence in the spaces designated for the 6th Ward Athletic Club. Rather, park on either side of the building or in the end spaces in the front lot. When parking, be sure to park between established lines so we can accommodate everyone and prevent damage to other vehicles. If your car is parked on or over a line, please be courteous and re-park your vehicle.

Additionally, staff not assigned a door code to 3WB should be prepared to show their badge when entering through the main door. If needing to enter through a side door, please reach out to your program staff to gain access to the building - please do not knock on the side doors to gain entry as it is disruptive to those working.

Present your EBT Card to purchase any amount of \$1 wooden Market tokens. You also will receive up to \$20 in SNAP Match vouchers from the Cooperstown Lions Club program. Use the wooden tokens and SNAP Match vouchers to buy any SNAP-eligible food.



You'll also receive a second match of up to \$20 in Double Up Food Bucks silver coins, to buy fruit, vegetables, and produce-bearing plants.





\$20=\$60

For a \$20 SNAP spend you earn \$60 worth of local food from the Farmers' Market.






Hot Off the Press

I am excited to announce that the Opportunities for Otsego 2025 Community Needs Assessment (CNA) is complete and ready to share! As a community action agency established under President Johnson's War of Poverty initiatives, our agency is a recipient of Community Services Block grant funding and required to complete a comprehensive community needs every three years. The report is a compilation of quantitative data gathered from the most recent census, program data, demographics and other statistical sources and qualitative information gathered from surveys and community forums to give a clear picture of Otsego County.

In early 2025, our agency sent surveys out to our clients, partners, board of directors, staff and the community at large to weigh in on factors such as transportation, childcare, housing, etc. From the data gathered, Opportunities for Otsego (OFO) held a Community Forum at the Foothills Performing Arts Center in late April 2025 to discuss the top issues identified from the initial survey at which more than 100 people gathered including non-profits, businesses, private citizens, consumers of OFO services, faith based organizations, education professionals, health care providers, and elected officials. At the forum, OFO facilitated healthy discussion on several key areas identified and focused on solutions to address the challenges in moving the needle to address them that were feasible to improve our community. It was through those conversations that we were able to come up with possible action steps to tackle those challenges.



One of my favorite quotes by Albert Einstein is "insanity is doing the same this over and over again and expecting different results". With the latest available data and input in the report, we now have an opportunity to assess and change to the current needs of our community. While OFO's next step is to take the 2025 CNA and use it to develop our agency's strategic plan for the next three years, it has many other powerful uses. We also plan and encourage others to use the data to leverage funding through grant opportunities by resourcing the report for statistical data. The good news is that all of that information is now in one place and can be accessed by all. We can address priorities, mobile resources, maximize partnerships for optimal outcomes. This collective report is also a resource to demonstrate and educate the masses and engage us civically as we are all stakeholders in our County's success. The information establishes baseline information, a current snapshot of our community, and enables us to see the trends, develop strategies, and support continued growth and improvement.

Megan Martin, our Planning and Research Director, is instrumental in this recurring assessment and I would be remiss in not thanking her for the time and dedication to its success. It is no small task gathering data from a multitude of sources, building and tracking survey results, planning a large community event, and compiling all the information into one comprehensive report that is clear and concise. We are all benefiting from the fruits of her labor.

The full 2025 OFO community Needs assessment is available in print version by request and electronically at https://ofoinc.org/press-room. While I know it is a large document, the information it contains is invaluable and is broken is to several sections to make it more manageable. It highlights our county's trends, strengths and challenges, demographics, and much more. I know we are all invested in the success of our communities and I hope to have tapped into your curiosity and encourage you to take a peek when you have time!
