

Examining Homes – How To

You will probably look at many homes before choosing one to buy, but you will not hire an inspector for every home you consider – that would get very expensive! Therefore, you need to know how to shop for homes wisely and look at features with a critical eye. It's important to identify all the positives – but it's <u>critical</u> to be able to spot trouble, too!

Be on the lookout for:

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What to Bring:

When you look at homes, it is helpful to bring the following:

- ✓ **Flashlight** You will want to get a good look at the less-lit areas of the home such as crawl spaces, attics, backs of closets, and cupboards
- ✓ Outlet Tester Use an outlet tester to test each outlet and see whether it is functioning and wired properly. You can buy an outlet tester at home improvement stores such as Lowes or Home Depot.
- ✓ **Small Level** Use a level to check for slopes in floors, walls, countertops, etc.
- ✓ Tape Measure Record the size of certain living spaces as well as components, such as cupboard depth, closet space, distance between windows, etc. This is especially important if you have large pieces of furniture that need to fit up stairways and/or into certain rooms.
- ✓ **Binoculars** It is difficult to see roofs from the ground. Binoculars will allow you to look more closely at the condition of roof tiles, flashing, soffits, etc.

Also, remember to wear comfortable clothing in case you need to go up and down steps and explore crawl spaces. Wear 'outdoor' shoes so you can take a full look at the yard and outbuildings and examine behind bushes that are along the wall(s) of the house.
